15 Riverside Park South beneath the Miller Highway

- ⑮ **Miller Highway**, 59th St. to 72nd St. An historic elevated section of the West Side Highway overlooking a new park, Riverside Park South.
- ⑯ **Soldiers and Sailors Monument**, 91st Street and Riverside Drive. Dedicated to the dead of the Civil and all subsequent American wars.

now stands at the foot of the George Washington Bridge.

- ⑳ **George Washington Bridge**. No New Yorker should die without crossing this mile-and-a-half long structure. Completed in 1931, it hosts fantastic views of the Hudson River, the New Jersey Palisades and to the south, New York City.

**LEG 7-10, 11a - ROCKLAND COUNTY**  
 (See BTB book, p. 76, 88, 96, 112, 122, 128)

- ⑳ **Lamont Doherty**. Earth Observatory. Largest oceanographic/geological lab in area.
- ㉑ **Snedden Landing**. Revolutionary War site named after a revolutionary sympathizer, Mollie Sneden, whose home still stands nearby.

On the Rails-to-Trails section of the BTB Trail between Piermont and Nyack

- ㉓ **Treason Site**, Route 9W, Haverstraw. Where Benedict Arnold met Major John André, a British spy, on September 21, 1780.
- ㉔ **St. Peter's Church**, 115 Broadway, Haverstraw. Oldest Catholic Church in county, founded by Irish immigrants. Original church burned down and was rebuilt.
- ㉕ **Stony Point Battlefield and Reservation**, 845-786-2521, Stony Point. Only Revolutionary War battlefield in the county.
- ㉖ **The WW II Moth Ball Fleet**. Monument to the "Hudson River Defense Reserve Fleet" just south of Jones Point.

**Nearby sites:**

- **Bear Mountain Inn**, Route 9W: Bear Mountain, 845-786-2731. Amenities await the weary walker at this stately and substantial inn.
- **Bear Mountain Wildlife Center**, Route 9W, Bear Mountain, 845-786-2731. Animals of the region plus trail side museums can be found along this section of the Appalachian Trail.

**LEG 5-6 - BERGEN COUNTY**  
 (See BTB book, p.53 - 56)

- ㉗ **Fort Lee Historic Park and Museum**. General Washington's perch while the British took over Fort Washington on the Manhattan side. Houses displays from the Revolutionary War.
- ㉘ **Ross Dock**. Recreational area.
- ㉙ **Blackledge-Kearney House Museum**. Built around 1750 and served as General Cornwallis' housing and temporary headquarters.

- ㉚ **Piermont Marsh** (Book, p. 76). Created naturally when the pier was built, it has become a fertile marsh home to birds and marine life.
- ㉛ **Pier at Piermont**. A mile-long pier that started as a railway terminus to seagoing vessels. Nearby is the historic village of Piermont with its quaint galleries, shops and restaurants.
- ㉜ **Nyack Historical Mansions** (Book, p. 88-96). Sight-see and tour the picturesque town and Victorian mansions.
- ㉝ **Hopper House and Museum**, 914-358-0774, 82 North Broadway, Nyack. Home of Edward Hopper, the famous depression-era American artist. Free admission.
- 32 **Tilcon Works**. An enormous gravel and sand operation with

- ㉞ **Hessian Lake**. Named for the 200-plus dead Hessian soldiers (employed by the British) thrown into the lake by General Washington and his troops.
- ㉟ **1776 Trail**. Now part of the Appalachian Trail, it was once used by armies during the Revolutionary War. A museum with ecological exhibits and a small
